Saint Gregory of Nazianzus

Oration 45, On Pascha

The Humility of the Incarnation

He who gives richly to all, who is not impoverished by giving, who is the source of light, the principle of wisdom, the treasury of grace and the giver of good things; he who is the Word before words, the intellect before intellects, the reason in all reasoning — this same Word, this reason, took flesh and became man, and was called Jesus Christ and was crucified. He endured the contradiction of sinners against himself, and submitted to such dishonor, so that he might save man from dishonor and raise us to his own dignity. He who is pure became impure; he who is without sin became sin; he who is without weakness took on our weakness, in order to save man and make us his own. By his first coming in poverty he proved that he is the lover of humanity; by his promised second coming in glory he will prove that he is the judge of all. Let us then prepare ourselves for both his comings, reverencing the one which has already taken place and longing with holy desire for the one which is still to come.
